city council would need to approve a budget amendment to enable the mayor to carry out her plan of removing the tree.

- 4. Five hours after I was copied on this email, I sent a response email to Councilwoman Dahlhoff informing her of what I had just learned—that the mayor was now planning to remove the tree that weekend. In this email, I wrote to Councilwoman Dahlhoff: "The mayor accepted a bid [and] wants it taken down this weekend. So that answers your questions."
- 5. I sent my response email to Councilwoman Dahlhoff at 9:07 p.m. on May 23, 2024, immediately after receiving a text message alerting me of the mayor's plan to have the tree removed Memorial Day weekend. I then drove home and spent the entire night preparing a request for an injunction and temporary restraining order.
- 6. The email from Councilwoman Dahlhoff to the mayor demonstrates that even within the city itself, there was confusion as to whether the mayor had the authority to carry out the removal of the Davis Meeker oak on her own, or whether she needed further approval by the city council.
- 7. I also was unaware before the night of May 23, 2024 that the mayor had decided definitively to remove the tree, and I likewise had no idea that she planned to do so Memorial Day weekend. In particular, when I testified at the May 21, 2024, Tumwater City Council meeting, I said, "People make mistakes. It's OK to make a mistake. You can always fix it. And that's what I'm here to ask to be done." I made this statement at 38:27 in the recording here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=RbAQ0ctEii8&list=PLE_nN-qDbnQqYIEbBFpMH9GFJyyM3CfSw&index=6.

SUPPLEMENTAL DECLARATION OF

- 8. In making this statement, I was referring to the mayor and city administrator. The minutes of the meeting attached to Mr. Meyers' September 4, 2024 declaration (Ex. 3 at 6) incorrectly state that I "asked the Council to fix the mistake." The rules for public testimony do not allow one to name who one is referring to, which is why I did not say who I was referring to.
- 9. I was asking for the mayor (not the council) to fix her mistake because I believed the mayor could be swayed by public testimony and statements of city councilmembers to get a second risk assessment or to order mitigation measures like pruning and cabling. At that time, it was clear to me that this sentiment that the mayor could be swayed was shared not only by those who testified but also by city councilmembers who made statements.
- 10. I did not initiate action to obtain a temporary restraining order until I discovered that we were all wrong. Only at 9:06 p.m. on May 23rd did I realize that the mayor was not going to change course and that the council had no role in approving a budget amendment in advance of the tree's removal.
- 11. Luckily, the mayor *was* capable of changing course at the Tumwater City Council meeting on June 4th, but only after hearing numerous extraordinary comments. There were 39 members of the public who testified for three minutes each at that meeting. There were so many members of the public that attended in person (in addition to many people on Zoom) that staff and Councilman Michael Althauser hurried to bring in extra chairs at the start of the meeting. After the public testimony ended, every single council member spoke at length as well. All of us were pleading with the mayor to save the tree. The meeting was historic. It lasted for four hours. During the public comments portion, it happened multiple times that just when I thought it could not get any better, the next person in line to testify would outdo the previous person. That is what it took to get the mayor to change course and to agree to a second risk assessment.
